okay, grandparent, grandmother. Grandfather, grandson, granddaughter.	00:02:06

sins of one generation can pass on, but the blessings of generations that	

are tuned in, like you and I have been tuned in, can go for a thousand

You've got to have boundaries. Brothers and 00:07:36 sisters, do you know what grandparenting is? It's the New Testament. It's 00:07:43 just love, love, love. Now, aren't you glad that you've moved from the Old 00:07:49 Testament to the New Testament so you can revel in this joy? God has 00:07:58 given you life to experience that. But be reminded Jesus didn't come to 00:08:02 abolish the law but fulfill it. As you fulfill the guidance and the directives 00:08:10 of your children who are parenting your grandchildren. Over 2.2 million grandparents are raising 7.5 million grandchildren 00:09:32 under the age of 18 full time. That takes a hit on your health. That takes a 00:09:41 hit on your energy. It's it's like you're not wired. It is so important that kids 00:09:46 have parents, but when grandparents have to fill that role. They're one of 00:09:56 my heroes. If you're a grandparent right now that is doing that, I salute 00:09:58

grandchildren. And so he's saying to Nellie, Hey, I got three of my	00:11:45
grandchildren. They live at a different state in Texas. And this is what I	00:11:51
want to raise to the lionesses of the kingdom that are here. We know in	00:12:03
Chronicles of Narnia, Aslan was the hero. You know who the heroes of the	00:12:07

year old grandson and say, hey, granddad's been carrying this a lot of

and da da da da. Okay. No, I'm talking about being appropriate.	00:14:13
However, we do know the more you're aware of your heritage, so says Dr.	00:14:16
Marshall Duke at Emory University. It builds resilience. This is a resilience	00:14:23

not going to go trick or treating. You're going to stand at the door and	00:16:15

every Halloween. Want to hear that story? Will you tell us, Granddad,	00:16:24

what I'm saying is simply this HERITAGE means sharing the things that	
are good and being vulnerable, appropriate to your grandchildren's age	
about things that would be helpful and encapsulated in HERITAGE. Is	00:16:53

Let me expand that. It's not only this, it's this and it's this. We have. Lots	00:17:01

HERITAGE, I do believe not only will identity be strengthened, but	
resilience. And what Duke found out during the teenage years, what do	00:17:32

it's been given by you. Here's the second thing. An example. Boy, as I	00:17:46

looked at the surveys of over 800 who were gueried to ask how their grandparents, their grandparents influenced them, they would say over and over how my grandfather cared for my grandmother when she was sick, how my grandmother took care of my grandfather, how they learned and taught us how to forgive others, how we learn to be grateful and full of gratitude. Those things that example just fixate in the mind of a young 00:18:20 child as they go forward. One of my colleagues, who was a therapist had 00:18:30 a young collegiate woman that was struggling as she adjusted to a collegiate college life. And he asked her, What keeps you from getting 00:18:42 involved in the behaviors that you know are not healthy and reckless? And 00:18:54 she looked he she looked back and said, I can never do that. Because my 00:19:00 grandmother told me and was an example I could never go against. She 00:19:07 was deceased. So from the grave here was this young collegian protected 00:19:08 by the example of a grandparent. Now the next piece. Yes. What I 00:19:16 discovered from a secular journal. And it's the Journal of Marriage and 00:19:25 Family, a well known journal not known for its biblical what I'd say insights. But the author of this article who interviewed grandchildren, said 00:19:33 something that really struck a chord. He noted that those adult children 00:19:42 whose grandparents were deceased, said, My grandpa, my grandma, my nana was like an angel. An angel in disguise. A guardian angel.
